

Courageous Parents Network's Blyth Lord will share research and resources that orient, ground and validate you in the many ways that you are being a good parent to your child.


Blyth Lord founded Courageous Parents Network in 2014, 13 years after the death of her daughter and nephew from infantile Tay-Sachs. Building on her career in television production and distance learning, she conceived of CPN as a way to bring the voices and lived experience of parents and clinicians to families actively caring for children with illness. She has worked with leaders in pediatric palliative care—doctors, nurses and nurse practitioners, social workers, patient advocacy groups, palliative and hospice care providers—as well as with families. She serves on the board of National Tay-Sachs and Allied Diseases Association, where she helps oversee NTSAD's family support services, and in CPN's liaison role to the American Academy of Pediatrics' Section on Hospice and Palliative Medicine. In 2021, Blyth received the Presidential Citation for Palliative Care Advocacy from AAHPM. Blyth received her BA in History from Yale College and a Masters in Education from Harvard University.

Most recently she was on the advisory board committee for the "1st edition of Elder and Disability Law in Massachusetts" published in September.
